



With this issue, our first of 2007, you will find what you always find, a comprehensive and entertaining slew of features and upcoming event highlights within the local arts and entertainment scene.



Empyrean welcomes Atlanta's Angie Aparo


We're giving the nod for Pick of the Issue, our opinion of the best show in Spokane over the next couple weeks, to the return of **Angie Aparo**, who will be playing at the recently re-opened Empyrean Coffee House on Friday, January 12th. With a slate of top-notch local singer/songwriters set to open the show, and Aparo's attention-grabbing, headlining performance to close it out, this evening should mark a fitting resurgence for the Empyrean as the biggest show held at the venue in months.

Angie Aparo, an indie rock force with some serious country roots, is in the midst of his most ambitious musical project to date. Starting last spring, Aparo vowed to release a trio of CDs over the course of the next 12 months that deal with overarching themes of love and war, a project referred to, appropriately, as the Love and War Trilogy (or, if you're a rabid Aparo fan, simply *the* trilogy). The second of

these three releases was made available on December 1st, and included the fantastic *Killing for Jesus*, amongst other tracks of similar substance.

While his songwriting stings with pertinence and his mixture of electronic rock fused into something more akin to pop-friendly alt-country is immediately striking, it's his voice that first grabs your attention. And it never really lets go. He's simply got an obvious, raw talent that's impossible to deny, which is especially helpful when you leave your band behind to play a tour full of solo gigs with nothing more than a guitar by your side.

While his name suggests the effeminate, Angie Aparo actually looks like a cross between Howie Mendell and the lead singer from *Live*, assuming that person was trained in at least two forms of martial arts. With a cool name, harsh look and surprisingly tender voice to back him up, he's making definite headway in the music business. Most recently, he's been brought on board to co-write songs for *American Idol* winner

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

Local bands work to keep the airwaves free at KYRS Benefit Show

KYRS Thin Air Radio is holding a benefit concert at The Spread on Saturday, January 20th in the process of celebrating their third year on the Spokane airwaves. Four of the best known names in local rock 'n roll will be performing, with Jupiter Effect, La Cha Cha, Tokio Weigh Station and Paper Genius all volunteering their talents.

Jupiter Effect will headline the concert (I think) with their home-grown fusion of funk, jazz and rock 'n roll, adding a bit of hip hop, pop, reggae and just about any other musical genre they've been exposed to for a little extra flavor. **La Cha Cha**, meanwhile, a fellow three piece that's every bit as funky and equally as rockin', will take the stage beforehand, with a sound that's deservedly getting a lot of attention within the Spokane music scene.

Tokio Weigh Station, the only four-piece on the bill for the evening, brings a more indie pop rock sound to the show, providing a musical set that begs to be sung along with. Like all the bands playing for the evening, these guys have been a recognized force on the local music scene for the past few months, so hopefully you can at least sing a chorus or two to one of their songs but, even if you've never heard them before, they've got the kind of sound that is accessible enough upon the first listen to demand audience participation, even (or perhaps especially) if you're drunk and singing nonsense.

Finally, **Paper Genius** will get things

going (unless I've totally screwed the order up, which is entirely possible), with a sound that we've raved about on a number of occasions as being simply superb, caught somewhere between rock and blues (but certainly not blues rock), and mixed with something entirely fresh and exciting.

All in all, this is a respectable bill from top to bottom full of great bands coming together for a good cause. What's not to like? The concert gets underway at The Spread, 230 W. Riverside, at 9 p.m. for 21+ only.

There will be a \$5 donation at the door, with proceeds going to KYRS, which can be heard at 92.3 FM (as well as 95.3 FM for now, until it moves to 89.9 FM in the near future). Check out the station over the days leading up to the concert to hear songs from all the performing bands on a variety of KYRS programs, or check out www.spokanesidekick.com for song samples and artist links. 🎸

The station consciously sets out to provide a forum for non-corporate and neglected perspectives and discussions on a number of local, national and global issues, reflecting values of peace, social, economic and environmental justice, human rights, democracy, multiculturalism, freedom of expression and social change. If this sounds like something you could get behind, then simply turn your dial to 92.3 or 95.3 FM, and head on down to The Spread on Saturday, January 20th.

LOCAL ARTIST SPOTLIGHT

Matt Tansy

Matt Tansy may look like he hasn't cracked his 20s, but he can play music like he's been doing it for 40 years. Between the guitar and piano, Tansy has some very apparent skills.

"I first learned piano when I was really young," explains Tansy. "From there I picked up my mom's guitar and have been working at it ever since. In high school I joined jazz band and also joined a ska band named 'Toby's'. That's when I really got into writing my own music."

Tansy's love for writing stayed with him through high school and took him to college. He is currently enrolled at Eastern Washington University in their music program.

"It's nice because I have the theory behind me, so I know what I'm doing when I sit down to write," says Tansy.

Matt has taken his education a step further by becoming a regular attraction at Brooklyn Nights in downtown Spokane. You can find him every Tuesday night playing a mix of guitar and piano, jazz and blues, covers and originals. When Tansy first started playing around Spokane, he only played instrumentals, but he's now recently added a microphone and lyrics.

"I just started singing recently after I went solo," he adds. "You have to give the crowd something else to keep their attention."

Tansy's music is hard to describe, as it's as varied as his background. Sometimes it's a little jazz, sometimes it's a little blues and, when he jumps on the piano, it sounds like I'm sitting in a saloon circa 1849. Regardless of the genre, Tansy can play it all with

the best of them. But while Tansy is a great solo performer, he belongs in a band, and he knows it.

"Right now I'm looking for a band, starting with a bass player and drummer," he says. "I've written tons of songs that are hard to play solo, but come to life with a bass line. I haven't wailed in a while and I would really like to get back to that."

When I asked Tansy what his optimal band would be if he could have anyone, living or dead, he answered, "Thelonious Monk on piano, Art Blakey on drums, and Charlie Parker on sax." Good choices – the SiDEKiCK approves – just so long as you don't make us pay a cover at the door.

Matt Tansy can be found every Tuesday night at Brooklyn Nights, 122 S. Monroe just behind Far West Billiards. This new nightspot has quickly become one of

the SiDEKiCK's favorite haunts. It is one of the few places you can find us having a beer and enjoying the Spokane nightlife. Yes that's right; Brian and I don't spend enough time together during the day that we have to hang out at night too. You can feel sad, that's a natural reaction. 🍷

Augustana returns as headliner

Augustana, a hyper-radio friendly pop rock band from Southern California (after migrating from Illinois, where they originally formed), will be in Spokane on Tuesday, January 16th for a performance at The Big Easy Concert House. Showtime is 8 p.m., with doors opening an hour prior for this all-ages concert.

Chances are, even if you haven't heard of Augustana by name, you probably heard their extremely popular radio single "Boston" when it was played last summer on a number of radio stations a minimum of 600 times every hour. "Boston" was the bonafide song of the moment for a few weeks last July and, while a lot of people seem to have forgotten about it entirely, I have personally played the living shit out of that tune. A quick glance at my Top 25 Most Played List in iTunes shows 16 listenings on my computer alone, which ties it for 7th along with Rainer Maria's "Terrified" and Ray LaMontagne's "Jolene." I don't know why I feel the need to share that information with you, but clearly the song gets my seal of approval. In fact, the first time I heard it, I thought it was a Badly Drawn Boy

single, and that's a good thing as far as I'm concerned.

To be sure, "Boston" is the most intensely listenable track on their debut album, *All the Stars and Boulevards*, yet the whole record is decent, happy, bubble gum rock (think Snow Patrol meets the Fray with a touch of Goo Goo Dolls). If that sounds like your bag, then head down to the Big Easy on Jan. 16th and sing along at the top of your lungs. I sure will be.

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

NFL Outburst of the Season

Let us set the stage: on an October Monday night game against the unbeaten Chicago Bears, the Arizona Cardinals have all but locked up the game, leading by 13 with five minutes remaining. However, after a mind-blowing display of incompetency that included a second fumble return and a punt return, both for touchdowns, the Bears ended up winning a game where they scored three offensive points and committed six turnovers.

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Caterina hosts trio of talented folk singers

Native Spokaneite and surprisingly accomplished singer/songwriter **Melody Moore** has recently relocated back to Spokane after spending a fair bit of time backpacking around the world and hanging out in Louisiana. More to the point, she can be seen playing at the Caterina Winery with a pair of similarly talented folk rock singers on Friday, January 12th.

According to her bio on www.sonicbids.com, "Melody Moore has accomplished a lot for a 23 year old. She has starred in 3 independent films (one of which she co-wrote and co-edited), released two records, trekked the Himalayan mountains alone at age 19 to 'find herself,' and built her own record label – Voluptuous Music. Her music has been featured on NPR, Desert Highway Radio, and the FTM Podcast Network." Um, I'm officially intimidated.

Listening to her, it's easy to see why she's gotten this much attention. Her approach to a largely acoustic catalogue is partly funky, partly dark and partly hopeful, but at all turns mature. Her voice is caught somewhere between Tori Amos and PJ Harvey, and there's such a soulful quality to the instrumentation that, to paraphrase Isaac Asimov's quote about writing, it sounds as if she's playing music

for the same reason she breathes – because she has to.

Actually, Moore isn't even the headliner at this show; she'll be opening for **John Craigie** and **Mark Ward**, either of which could just as easily have been the focus of this article. Ward, for example, is a familiar and talented face on the Spokane music scene, sounding a bit like a folksy Elliot Smith, while John Craigie is a touring folk singer from San Francisco in the vein of Woody Guthrie meets Stephen Stills, who really

deserves an article of his own. I guess I just found Moore's story interesting and wanted to share it. It doesn't really matter who you choose to highlight from this show, the plain and simple fact is that this is an upcoming concert worth writing about.

American hostages, shiny magazine covers, and gearing up for the media revolution

Dear Whomever,

Did you hear the good news? You are the Person of the Year; those cajoling assholes at TIME Magazine said so. They even put a shiny little mirror on the cover so you can look at yourself while standing at line at Wal-Mart, admiring your new haircut and how, in the right light, you look a little bit like Nicole Kidman. You rule. Go ahead and take the rest of the day off; you've done enough for one afternoon.

This seemingly innocuous distinction, while clearly meaningless, really pisses me off. Partly it's because I'm insane and get worked up at stuff like this. Partly it's because I've never liked TIME and am immediately suspicious of everything they do. But mostly this just seems like hypocrisy, deception and underhanded flattery at its most seemingly benign and ridiculous.

TIME defines their criteria to be Person of the Year as "the individual or group of individuals who, for better or worse, have had the biggest effect on the year's news." As such, it's not an honor but a distinction. That's why Adolf Hitler and Joseph Stalin won the award back when TIME

had a shred of dignity.

Then, in 1979, they named Ayatollah Khomeini, a veritable douche bag, their Man of the Year, partially for his role of the Iranian hostage crisis where 63 Americans were held captive by Khomeini's followers in the American embassy in Tehran. This pronouncement pissed off a lot of people, so TIME folded like a cheap suit; since 1979 they haven't named anyone their Person of the Year unless they think it will make their readers happy. The most obvious example was giving the award to Rudolph Giuliani in 2001 when, by their own criteria, Osama bin Laden was the clear choice. But that, admittedly, would have been a complete shit storm for TIME so, instead of changing the standards for what the award signifies, they simply skewed the facts. In their celebration of Giuliani's post 9/11 leadership, they wrote, "bin Laden is too small a man to get the credit for all that has happened in America in the autumn of 2001." Sure, keep telling yourself that's the reason.

Lately, they've just been doling out their climactic award to make people feel good: The Good Samaritans last year (Bono, Bill and Melinda Gates), the corporate whistleblowers in 2002 (Cynthia Cooper, Sherron Watkins and Coleen Rowley) and, my personal favorite, The American Soldier in 2003.

This is really where I stop and give pause. In 2003, when a majority of Americans supported the American presence in Iraq, TIME took advantage of the national sentiment to give a shout out to the troops, "For uncommon skills and service," they gushed, "for the choices each one of them has made and the ones still ahead, for the challenge of defending not only our freedoms but those barely stirring half a world away, the American soldier is TIME's Person of the Year." It just makes you feel warm and fuzzy all over, doesn't it?

Yet now that the war's not so popular, TIME (along with what seems like the vast majority of major media suppliers) has jumped headfirst off that bandwagon. It's extremely fashionable now to blast Republicans and their many failings without any mention that the people pointing the finger are often the ones who were waving flags a couple years ago.

So I think that's really where my anger stems from here. TIME has always been opportunistic as all get out and, as such, has been a part of the media problem in America for some time now. So for them to celebrate something like a more democratic online media movement seems disingenuous at best. If there is ever to be a true media revolution, TIME will be one of the first on the chopping block;

they pander way too much to the reader, routinely manipulate facts to fit the national mentality of the time, and push infotainment over valuable journalism issue after issue. The idea of deconstructing the line between the people who ingest news and the people who dispense it should be celebrated, but for TIME, and others like them, to shirk any sort of responsibility in being part of the problem is aggravating and completely misses the point.

In its celebration of "you," TIME wrote, "For seizing the reins of the global media, for founding and framing the new digital democracy, for working for nothing and beating the pros at their own game, TIME's Person of the Year for 2006 is you." Either TIME doesn't realize that they're one of the "pros" who are being undercut, or they're trying to squelch the information uprising by suggesting that it's already been won. And that's not the case; not by a long shot. As TIME is shamelessly fellating you, I hope you all realize that the fight is a long, long way from over. ●

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Children of Men a cinematic triumph

I can't say that **Children of Men** is the best movie of 2006. There were a number of seemingly interesting films released last year that I wholly intended to see but never got around to watching, and it's unfair to completely count them out. I can say, though, with a certain amount of conviction, that this was the most satisfying theatrical viewing experience I've had in years.

Children of Men, to give the necessary back story, is a dystopian futuristic vision where women have lost the ability to conceive for reasons that are never made entirely clear. A lot of viewers and critics seemed bothered by the apparent lack of explanation but, unless I missed something, that sort of seemed like the point. Director

Alfonso Cuarón and company manage to tease out a number of themes – religious, political and humanistic – in a deceptively simple story where survival is really the only thing that matters. Refusing to explain the reason for this unsettling chain of events, then, makes *Children of Men* more allegory than prophesy, but that doesn't make it any less powerful.

This is a brilliant story, to be sure, but it's also unspeakably astute filmmaking at its best and most cinematic. Everything here is working. The casting is spot-on (and the acting follows suit), the story is remarkable at all turns, and the cinematography is so staggeringly beautiful that I simply can't find the words to describe it. At turns frightening, funny, tender and thrilling, *Children of Men* is seemingly ev-

ery human emotion in an assuredly human and engaging story.

Some movies I have the task of reviewing are so mediocre and self-explanatory that I have a hard time coming up with 500 words worth saying about them. Yet, with others, I feel like I need thousands of words to fully articulate why the film was as good (or bad) as it was.

Children of Men is such a film.

To fully lay out the reasons this was such a powerful story, to me, I would need several pages of explanation that would include how I saw the Human Project as an allegory for the hope of a better land (i.e. the promise of America), the religious implications of building a movement around a prophet and how they're manipulated for political gain, and subtle ways in which the dystopian future they've laid out is largely rooted in the world of today, even if that world is almost entirely a war-torn ghetto.

But that statement's a bit too academic to be of much use, especially if you haven't seen the movie. The important thing to understand is that *Children of Men* manages to be both complex and simple, both depressing and hopeful, both tangible and enigmatic. Which is precisely what I loved about it; there's enough to hold onto in order to take away something valuable, yet

whatever conclusion you come to is ultimately your own.

Alfonso Cuarón (who revived the Harry Potter franchise by making the third installment genuinely fantastic) once again injects life into every frame. The whole world of *Children of Men* feels authentic and accessible in the most powerful and holistic possible way. As an added bonus, Clive Owen is in it, and he can make a boring office hack look like a cross between James Bond and James Dean, only cooler.

The last time I can remember leaving the theatre so completely satisfied on every level was *28 Days Later*, oddly another quasi-apocalyptic film set in Britain (which might suggest that I'm a morbid weirdo who simply likes this sort of thing). But if the point of this review is to get one man's critical

opinion, then I can't overstate how much

I liked this movie. It sounds outlandish to call *Children of Men* the best new movie I've seen so far in the 21st century – like I'm Larry King doling

out insanely over-the-top

flattery to try and get on

a film jacket or some-

thing – but, when

I think back,

that's honestly

how I feel. No

other movie

I've seen in

the past

several years

even comes

We are Marshall is an extraordinarily emotional chronicle of an extraordinary story, as the Marshall University football program rises from the ashes of complete disaster to celebrate pretty much everything that's great about sports.

Rudy! Rudy! Rudy! I think that should

be the title of the film, repeated three times, with exclamation points and all, as that seems to be the only thing that people remember about it. Every time Sam (Sean Astin) came on screen in the *Lord of the Rings* movies, I found myself silently

chanting Rudy! Rudy!, because that's what he'll always be remembered as for me – and a lot of other people like me – a mediocre linebacker with a heart of gold.

Last Boy

Scout is really more of an action film than a football flick, but I like it, so it makes the list. Definitely a guilty pleasure for me, as it has nothing to offer besides pure, idiotic entertainment. There's some great one-liners, some pretty good action scenes, and Bruce Willis is at his most unintentionally hilarious.



Little Giants is *The Sandlot* of football films, meaning it's a great kid's flick that celebrates everything a children's sports epic should. Plus, John Madden has a cameo, and that's just great (for more on why I love John Madden, flip to page 23).

The Bad:

Varsity Blues tries to provide MTV excitement and heartwarming triumph at the same time and manages to fail on both accounts. It's

moderately entertaining, I guess, but ultimately a joke of a film whose main triumph seems to be that black people play football as well as white people. Um .. OK.

Radio is touching at times and infuriating at others, in the end turning out to be a nice story gone horribly wrong. The



complete lack of focus is maddening.

Necessary Roughness: Kinda funny, unabashedly silly and predictably stupid.

The Downright Awful (a.k.a. The Ugly):

The Waterboy is probably the worst Adam Sandler film of all time, and that's saying something. Less funny than *The Wedding Singer* and more improbable than *Happy Gilmore*. Ouch.

The Replacements, on the other hand, has to be mentioned as one of the worst Keanu Reeves films ever made, and he was in two Bill and Ted movies for Christ sake. *The Replacement's* heart is in the right place, but that means very little when there's no brain attached.

Air Bud: Golden Receiver. Actually, I haven't seen this film, but I don't think that should disqualify me from putting it in this category. It's about a football playing dog ... And it's a sequel! 🎬



Spokane poets prepare for nationals at monthly poetry slams

Spokane's relatively new, monthly competition known as **Poetry Slam** is quickly gaining converts. Although it's only been held in town since mid-October, people are, according to Slammaster Daniel Harrington, "coming out of the woodwork" to be a part of it. He estimated that, at the last event, "at least 100 people came through the door," which strikes us as a pretty good turnout for a poetry reading, no matter how lively and competitive it might be.

Poetry Slam first developed in 1987 as a natural evolution of the beat generation. Poetry readings had developed a poor reputation, carrying a stigma of dullness and elitism (picture a guy in a beret and sunglasses reading in a monotone voice). Slam Poetry aims to challenge that stereotype by livening up the event, to the point where how you say something is as important as what you're saying.

"This movement is growing from the ground up," Harrington says about local Poetry Slams, adding "It's a great avenue for expression in the Spokane community."

The competition works like this: 12 people compete in front of a panel of five judges who award each performer an Olympic style score (0 to 10 with 10 being the best), with the best and worst scores then dropped. Judges are selected at random from the audience at the beginning of the slam, with the only two requirements being that you must be present the whole time and you must be able to speak the English language.

A large part of the score is determined by the performance of the piece, so all

routines are practiced and perfected beforehand. Also, performances are limited to three minutes, must be original, and can contain no props.

To enter all you need to do is show up with at least two pieces to perform. Competitions are limited to 12-15 contestants, so you might want to consider arriving early. Entry fee is \$5.

The winner of each night's slam will receive \$40 cash with other prizes given out to runner's up.

The Spokane Slam, now established as a monthly staple at the Caterina

Winery, takes place one Wednesday in the middle of every month. This month's

Slam will take place on Wednesday, January 17th at 7:30 p.m., with future slams planned for February and March 21st.

In addition to the competition of local talent at every event, there is also a featured, professional poet on hand for a little extra flavor, with some exciting national names in the works over the next few months.


With this much interest expressed in these events, Harrington plans to foster this communal atmosphere, with a hope of building a national team to compete at the finals in Austin this summer, and sending a single representative to Vancouver for the individual finals.



The Main Dish: Thai Bamboo

In the language of Thailand, the word Thai literally means "freedom." The country is literally called "Freedom Land." While this is kind of funny in light of the September 2006 coup d'état that toppled the Prime Minister, dissolved Parliament, and imposed martial law, they still have really good food. And is there anything more important than that?

According to wikipedia, Thai cuisine is known for its balance of five fundamental flavors in each meal – hot (spicy), sour, sweet, salty and sometimes bitter. Basically the goal is a veritable explosion of flavors in your mouth. This will be my benchmark as I try the Spokane-owned-and-operated Thai chain, Thai Bamboo. With three locations across town (South Hill, Division, Valley) it is not nearly as prevalent as McDonalds, but you are never very far away.

The South Hill Restaurant is Thai Bamboo's flagship location. Containing tons of imported stone art, woodcarvings, and a fountain or two, the restaurant looked like what I expect Thailand is like. And with planter after planter filled with real bamboo, the place felt close to nature.

My biggest problem with Thai food is I never know what to order and the wide selection on the menu made it even harder. Being a sheep, I chose the meal literally billed as "most popular Thai dish," the Phad Thai – a tasty concoction of stir-fried Thai rice noodles, egg, ground peanuts, onions, cabbage and chicken.

I can see where it got the reputation – the food tasted as good as it looked. The dish hit at least three of the essential

I went out on a limb and didn't get the curry. I got the Cashew Chicken instead. It was an alright dish, but really had nothing to make it stand out from most Asian cuisine. It was a generous portion with plenty for leftovers but, to be honest, I should have gotten the curry. All in all, though, if you love Asian cuisine, you would probably find it quite tasty.

flavors with flying colors (spicy, sweet, salty), but lacked a little in the sour and bitter categories. Personally I think it tasted better because of it. The meal was also huge and I was only able to eat about one-third of it. I could have easily split the dish and still been full. The ground peanuts were like heaven in my mouth and their flavor permeated everything else on the plate.

My only disappointment with the meal was the appetizer of calamari rings. I have never been able to find a single restaurant in this town that does calamari well. Would someone please suggest a place so I don't develop a complex? Every time I see it on a menu I get excited and think "Calamari! I love calamari." But I am ALWAYS disappointed when it arrives at the table, and it is always something different. Thai

Bamboo's problem was that the calamari itself looked and tasted like something I would get from Skippers – manufactured and mass-produced. While their Thai dipping sauce was awesome, the calamari itself wasn't worthy of the sauce.

Overall the menu was very diverse, the food was bowl-licking good, the portions were huge, the prices were reasonable (\$8-13), and the décor was inviting. My meal was also prepared really fast, so if you're looking for a high-quality, speedy lunch during the work week, I would recommend Thai Bamboo for your consideration. 




