can be found at 905 N. Washington, roughly where Washington meets North River Drive.



Lovers for the New Year

Clumsy Lovers, a high-energy bluegrass band who filter their folk roots through a punk rock siv, are Canadian and therefore don't believe in Christmas, New Year's Eve or anything else relating to the Gregorian calendar. So they've migrated south for their current Christmas tour and will be bringing in the New Year in and around Spokane, where these sorts of end of the

year celebrations are encouraged. You can catch them on Saturday, December 30th at the Big Easy Concert House in Spokane, followed by a New Year's Eve show at Schweitzer Mountain Resort near Sandpoint, Idaho.

Clumsy Lovers can be

described as a relentlessly touring jam band that's on the road over 300 days a year, a group that has embraced the term "raging Celtic bluegrass rock" as an adequate encapsulation of their tenacious music. They cover everything from AC/DC to Woody Guthrie in their concerts, and are known for their rollicking live shows that include foot-stomping fiddle and banjo solos, with the drummer occasionally hitting fiddle notes with his drumsticks. The mandolin, harmonica and, of course, bass and guitar all figure prominently in crafting the unique and extremely popular Clumsy

Lovers sound.

They recently released their seventh album, Smart Kid, a typical Clumsy Lovers release in that it's routinely surprising, while never really straying from their distinctive style. There's a more laid-back, almost reggae vibe to some of the tracks, while the sort of hard working rock 'n roll ethic is ever present, a principle instilled after a decade of incessant touring where they've played over 1500 live shows since the mid-90s. Unassuming,

Spotlight: Skillet Jones and the Funky-Fi Collectors

Normal interviews bore me – typically I couldn't care less how a musician was inspired by their grandfather, or how their music stems from The Beatles and Danzig at the same time. This is not one of those interviews.

I sat down with Skillet Jones and Danger Dan of **Skillet Jones and the Funky-Fi Collectors** during one of their weekly band practices... that happen to take place every Wednesday night at The Spread.

"This is only the second time we have ever played together," admits Jones, who is

no stranger to the Spokane music scene. Jones was an integral part of SOUP, a tour de force of rotating musicians that played weekly at Mootsy's back in the 90's.

"Wednesday nights at The Spread is where we hone our game for weekend gigs," adds Dan, also a veteran of the music scene. Dan is the keyboardist of Jupiter Effect, a funky-threesome that plays frequently around town.

The first question I ask is "What is sadder? That I am drinking alone or that I am double fisting while drinking alone?" This is actually a test to see if I want to continue the interview.

"Seven drinks is sad; you're OK," answers Jones. Correct answer, the interview continues.

On to the name – what the hell is Skillet Jones and the Funky-Fi Collectors? It is an awesome name, but where does it

It would be lazy of us to merely say that The Wailers need no introduction, but it's kind of pointless to try and familiarize you with a band as universally known as this seven-piece reggae outfit that was led by a bonafide cultural icon. So I'm going to tell you a bunch of facts and accolades about The Wailers that you might not have known:

Counting their days since they were Bob Marley & The Wailers, the band has sold more than a quarter billion albums worldwide, (exactly one record for every dollar the Texas Rangers blew on Alex Rodriguez recordsetting contract in 2001). They were named "Band of the Year" by Rolling Stone in 1976, have a Peace Medal of the Third World from the United Nations and their song "One Love" was named "Song




Greatest Invention of 2006:

Anybody that identifies his or herself as a Conservative Christian is going to have a hard time coming to any personally realized beliefs when there is a set of rules instructing them how to live, and it is generally assumed that the Republican Party is following the will of God in anything they do. In this instance, obedience is an immediate reaction, and investigation comes secondary, if at all.

On the other hand, the loose cluster on the left side of that somewhat arbitrary line I've drawn often feels the need to shun God entirely. There is often an immediate contempt towards those that are tied to their faith with the conviction that a little league coach teaches fundamentals. Anyone who does not hold The Bible in such high esteem usually runs the gamut from complete religious apathy to an instinctual rejection of God because they distrust the way a belief in God has manifested itself in the day-to-day running of the world.

This, to me, is a tragedy on both counts. Last time I checked, God was not the acting political leader for any country in the world (even if President Bush seems to think He visits him in his dreams, bringing cupcakes and foreign policy suggestions). Rejecting God because you don't like his fan club is illogical. It's on par with hating the band Phish when what you really hate is their

legion of fans who are unbearably annoying in their deification of a mediocre Vermont jam band (and aren't helping their cause with a complete indifference to the act of showering). Yet blindly assuming that every action carried out by the Fundamentalist regime we've elected is in the best interest of the world because they are devote believers and must certainly be acting in the best of Christian interests is equally as deplorable, in my mind.

There is a logical ground here that is severely lacking in contemporary thought. In practice, there is room on the left for spirituality and accepting God. "If God didn't exist, it would be necessary to invent him," as Voltaire said, and he's absolutely right. Nothing makes sense without God and the way we choose to "glorify" him has nothing to do with his existence or absence. Similarly, refusing to evolve or adapt socially in the beliefs you hold because of fear or devotion is a distressing line of thought that prevents us from anything resembling progressive action.

Isn't there a logical meeting point where we can accept God but choose, as worship, to live our lives presently to the best of our abilities, instead of waiting for the rewards of heaven? Isn't there a way where we can come to more honest values that are individually held instead of kowtowing to a

set of beliefs that are largely outdated? Isn't there some way that we can have people like Pat Robertson drawn and guartered?

I can't be the only one who thinks that, for too long, religious groups have pushed pacifists and leftists and countless others to the margins, alienating millions of people that believe in fundamental goodness and a universal sense of belonging. There is a logical desensitization to religion by people that don't like the way religious beliefs have adversely affected public policy, but this is the easy way out. On the one side, shunning good people because they don't align with your beliefs is pious and deceitful, but shunning God out of some sort of desire to look cool or some sort of contempt towards secular fundamentalist practices is simply dishonest. We've evolved enough to the point where we can ask these questions for ourselves and arrive at our own answers instead of reverting to base, visceral reactions that are only widening an already vast and imposing gap in thought.




have been, had we not found out about it a scant few hours before we went to print). Check out their first ever Spokane concert; we definitely will be.

TOP FIVE ALBUNS OF 2006

Whittling this list down to five records was difficult, verging on impossible (**Gnarls Barkley**'s *St. Elsewhere* and **The Raconteurs**' *Broken Boy Soldiers* were especially difficult to exclude). But I managed to boil it down to what I consider the essentials for the past 12 months. As a disclaimer, you should know that I'm an unabashed lover of rock 'n roll and all these albums fall into that category in some way, shape or form. But here they are, the five best albums of the year, in one man's opinion:



Snow Patrol *Eyes Open*

On their latest release, Snow Patrol sound like they're trying to be U2 at their most epic and, with any other band, that would be a recipe for disaster. But they pull it off, and quite easily, may I add. *Eyes Open* is epic to the extreme, a lovestruck collection of songs that sometimes suffers from what can only described as poor lyrics, but other times is as beautiful as anything you're likely to hear on mainstream radio. Musically, their latest album blows away anything they've done so far. After striking gold a few years ago with *Final Straw*, it would have made more sense to pull it back a bit than try to outrock an album that stretched the bounds of what most people thought them capable. But they didn't – they turned it up a notch – and listening to *Eyes Open*, it's recommended that you do the same.



As with their debut album, The Killers sophomore effort wavers from somewhat forgettable background music to impossibly engaging rock 'n roll. Their songs don't always work but, when The Killers are firing on all cylinders, it's some of the catchiest rock around. The radio single "When You Were Young," remains one of the best tracks on the album, but it certainly isn't the only one worth mentioning. The opening, title track explodes with energy, while the last three songs, "My List," "This River is Wild" and "Why do I Keep Counting?" build to a nice crescendo to close the record out before the beautiful "Exitlude" signs off the album entirely. All in all, a strong second effort from the Las Vegas quartet.




Clap Your Hands Say Yeah Clap Your Hands Say Yeah

There is an extraordinarily healthy synthesis of rhythmic, often electronic rock 'n roll that's emerging in this young century. Obviously Radiohead is at the forefront here, but Cloud Cult, Air, Sia and many, many others are all creating consistently interesting works. After Clap Your Hands Say Yeah's debut album, it's now mandatory to include them in this conversation, as well. Their songs are an infectious blend of ambient sounds, a medley of instruments, off-key singing and lyrics like, "You look like David Bowie/But you've nothing new to show me/start another fire/ And watch it slowly die," an emotive slice of happiness in a strange, almost haunting sadness.



Catastrophe Keeps Us Together is part melancholy, part hope, part stripped down rock and part straight up roll. It's not quite a concept album, but there's something cohesive about it – painting a bittersweet portrait of disconnection (or maybe connection) amidst some sort of apocylapse, even if it's almost certainly all in lead singer Caithlin De Marrais' head. There isn't a weak song on the entire disc, but there are certainly a couple of strong ones. Of all the singles I've played to death over the past year, the title track that kicks off the album and the beautiful "Terrified" are both somewhere near the top of the list. Rainer Maria has exited at the top of their game - playing their last show on December 16th before reportedly going their separate ways, and Catastrophe is a wholly worthy swan song.



I'm a staunch believer that younger generations have the right to challenge older ones, especially as it comes to art forms, forging their own way as they see fit. As such, I'm much more impressed with a band like Wilco or Modest Mouse, or even the Red Hot Chili Peppers, reinventing their sound or carving a new one, than I am by the canonical groups rehashing the same old blues chords over and over again. I have almost no interest in listening to the newest Rolling Stones or Paul Simon albums, for example, or even Tom Petty, Billy Joel or U2. Most of their outputs are perfectly acceptable, but their time is up, as far as I'm concerned. Their revolution failed and it's time to pass the torch.

However, there are a couple of notable exceptions to this sweeping, self-imposed rule. Bruce Springsteen falls in a somewhat more interesting category, while Bob Dylan and Neil Young never cease to amaze me, rewriting the rulebook every few years.

You could probably say this about Neil Young's entire career, but for the past decade or more it's been especially true: roughly every other album that Neil Young releases is wholly mediocre; the other is entirely phenomenal. 1995's *Mirror Ball* was so good that he brought on Pearl Jam as a supporting band, and you almost don't care who's backing him up. 2000's *Silver & Gold* has one standout track – "Razor Love" – and the rest is mired in mediocrity. The same can be said of 2002's *Are You Passionate?*, with "Let's Roll" being the one consistently listenable song surrounded by some illconceived and somewhat dull R&B. The following year, Neil crafted the concept album *Greendale*, a Village Green type look at an American

community and enigmatic investigation of contemporary values that fluctuates from fantastic bluesrock to a breathtakingly beautiful portrait of a small town. Top notch stuff. Then, last year Neil thought he was dying and wrote


what he intended to

be his swan song, *Prarie Wind*, a decent but somewhat rushed collection that relied heavily on images and ideas he'd already mulled over one too many times.

Finally, this year, Neil got pissed off.

Simply put, *Living with War* is his best effort since at least *Rust Never Sleeps* (1979), and possibly *After the Gold Rush* (1970). Arguably his angriest album, and probably his most rockin', he still maintains a sense of hope and purpose that's as progressive as it is coherent. At times it's admittedly about as eloquent as the liner notes to a Creed album, with lyrics like "Let's Impeach the President for hijacking our religion, and using it to get elected," but it's as timely an output since Springsteen's *The Rising* captured the post 9/11 mood with equal verve.

Living With War is an unabashed indictment of American consumerist and war-mongering attitudes that's unapolagetically blunt, but still manages to avoid being disrespectful. The clunky guitars and signature Neil voice, coupled with backup singers belting out choruses amidst spoken word quips from George W. Bush and Neil himself, it's easily the best record in a year where there were a lot of good records. It's an immediate and extremely timely album that should be listened to for years to come.

Perhaps more than any other time of the year, the holiday season is the best for falling into the comfortable lull of stories that you know by heart. There's something appealing about being entertained with a familiar tale in the midst of Christmas, winter and the fading of the year. 

FILM Solution We are Marshall packs an emotional punch

I'm a sucker for inspirational sports films, so I knew heading into **We are Marshall** that I was going to like it. It's everything you'd expect from the trailers, meaning it's a decidedly cheesy and inspiring tale of hardships, heart and football. And that suits me just fine.

This pretty remarkable true story tells of the Marshall Thundering Herd football team when, in 1970, the entire team – save a couple injured players – are killed in a plane crash coming back from a game in North Carolina. The following, rebuilding season that ensues is rife for heartbreak and triumph, and the

filmmakers tease these emotions out with a high degree of success.

I often have a problem with true stories, as any faults that arise are immediately dismissed because, hey, you can't blame somebody for simply telling you what happened. But, as golden age of Hollywood producer David O. Selznick said, "If the legend outlives history, rewrite history," and director Joseph McGinty Nichol (I refuse to call him McG, although that's what he commands to be credited as) does a commendable job playing loose enough with the dialogue and characters to craft an engaging story that stays true enough to the events that transpired.

If you're looking for a documentary on the struggles of the 1970's Marshall football program – this isn't it. If you're looking for an uplifting story of moral sports victories and interesting characters, *We are Marshall* is the best such output I've seen in years.

The football footage is pretty typical for Hollywood, which is to say it's unrealistic as all get out. Every hit looks like it should leave somebody paralyzed or possibly decapitated. But the on-the-field action remains an integral part of the story, and doesn't take away from the story of this devastated town and the various people that make it up.

Matthew McConaughey is borderline retarded as their new football coach, although that's not altogether uexpected, as that's what you get when you cast Matthew



McConaughey. It doesn't matter, though, as he's immensely entertaining in a lead role of sorts, which is a lot more than I can say about Matthew Fox, who's, unfortunately, vintage Matthew Fox. He brings out the "Matthew Fox Face" in full force here, the patented look that he uses to try and convey every emotion, whether he's telling a knock-knock joke or weeping at a funeral. The key element is the scrunched face that's trying to be likeable but is, in reality, pure seriousness at every turn. As a result, it always sort of looks like he's sucking on a lemon or possibly smelling a fart.

On the plus side, David Straitharn is

in *We are Marshall* and he's just a fantastic actor that pumps additional emotion into a story that's already overflowing with it. Make no mistake in that regard, I was an emotional train wreck watching this film. There was more than one occasion where I wept like a little girl who just saw Bambi for the first time.

We are Marshall isn't as beautifully shot as *Seabiscuit* – my all-time favorite film in this genre – nor is it as well acted or as adeptly told across the board. But it's every bit as emotional and heart-rendering, which makes it an unequivocal success in my mind.

Naked a difficult but rewarding British art film

Despite sounding like the most generic porno ever made, **Naked** is actually a 1993 art film of sorts from the United Kingdom. The story, as such, revolves around Johnny, a transient who's probably best described by that well-worn but tried and true distinction "brilliant but troubled." He's the central, complex figure in a relatively simple tale of a drifter bumming about London on the lam from the law after stealing a car and possibly raping a girl.

Clearly, Johnny is a complete asshole – a brutal, homeless intellectual who has a mild obsession with the apocalypse and a definite pension for violent sex. He's an anti-hero on steroids, as he's completely deplorable in almost every way, yet you somehow find yourself liking him – if only a little bit – despite these gaping character flaws. Other characters weave in and out to mold a darkly funny and extremely poignant view of post-modern England that's somewhat enigmatic but nevertheless tangible. The movie loses steam towards the end, but remains an undeniably entertaining and scintillating indictment of consumerist attitudes and emotional disconnection.

Obviously, I really liked *Naked*, but you should now going in that, at times, this is a pretty difficult film to watch, with harsh sex scenes verging on rape that makes anything David Cronenberg ever shot look like tender love between two consenting adults. But

there's much more to *Naked* than the title would indicate, and much of that revolves around Johnny challenging and offending pretty much everyone he meets.

David Thewlis, the dude that played Professor Lupin in the last couple Harry Potter flicks, is pretty decent in the lead role. He's like the British version of Ethan Hawke – not a particularly talented actor but it doesn't matter because he's so engaging to watch. On the other hand, Katrin Cartlidge (*From Hell, Breaking the Waves*) gives, in my estimation, the best performance in the film as an aloof cross between a drug addict and a sort of nurturing figure for the disillusioned and largely disgusting Johnny.

All in all, the characters are interesting, the actors adept, the dialogue engaging, the soundtrack beautiful and the cinematography jaw-dropping. Everything here is working in its favor. Yet it probably seems somewhat random that I would review a 90s art film that has absolutely nothing

to do with the theme of this issue or the rest of the paper in general. The justification, if I even need one, is that I found it such a rewarding viewing experience, I simply wanted to share it.

I've watched a lot of supposedly great, usually foreign art films over the years and have come to the conclusion that most of them pretty much blow. A couple days before watching *Naked*, for example, I checked out a Jean-Luc Goddard film called *Masculine/ Feminine* that's supposed to be this shining exemplar of French New Wave Cinema. It's not. There are some nice moments but, when they're connected in only the loosest and vaguest possible ways, then the novelty is completely lost. If you're allowed to come to whatever conclusions you want about the story, then every conclusion becomes equally meaningless. You need some sort of framework to operate in or there will be nothing tangible to take away beyond an image or a line of dialogue. Yet you see this sort of approach time and time again in movies that are conscious of their standing outside the exclusive Hollywood club.

So I think that's what I found so refreshing about Naked. It's creative enough to be unique yet smart enough to be coherent. If you're OK with the rental clerk giving you an askew glance, assuming you've rented a low-budget porn, then *Naked* strikes me as a nice tiptoe away from Hollywood cinema in a self-contained story that's still transcendent in all the ways blockbusters typically aren't.

Runners-up: Michael Richards and Mel Gibson for staggeringly deep-seeded public displays of racist and anti-Semitic attitudes.





Sometimes I just don't have time to sit down for a full meal – hell, most of the time I don't even have time to eat. This being the case, if I find a place that makes great food and is snappy about it I don't forget it. Casey's Place, located at 13817 E. Sprague Ave in the Spokane Valley across from Target, falls into this category.

The food here is very simple – sandwiches, soups and salads. Everything is easy to make and is out to you fast. My food was at my table before I made it back from the bathroom (This could mean a lot so to clarify, I was washing my hands. There was no paperwork involved). I was in and out in under 30 minutes with only a mild case of indigestion from eating too fast.

I ordered the daily special, which was an awesome deal – a half sandwich (note: a few of the more exotic sandwiches are excluded from this deal), cup of soup, bag of chips and soda for \$6.25. Oh, and free popcorn. The sandwich was a Casey's Club containing turkey, ham, bacon, provolone and cheddar on thick French bread with mayo and mustard. It was awesome. You know the bread is fresh when you finish your meal and there are no breadcrumbs on the plate. The meat was equally moist and piled high in a way that would make Subway green with envy.

I found Casey's Place to be quaint but quite good. My sandwich was awesome, my soup was a little bland, but the lunch special was a really great deal. It was a very quick turn around time which is great when you don't have a lot of time for lunch. I would most definitely visit Casey's again for lunch.

On the other hand the split pea soup was totally forgettable. While it wasn't bad, and I definitely devoured the whole cup, it lacked that special something that would make it stand on its own. Combined with the sandwich it was totally sufficient – on its own I would have been wholly disappointed.




